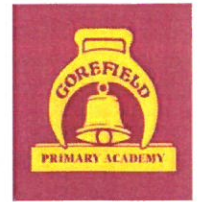

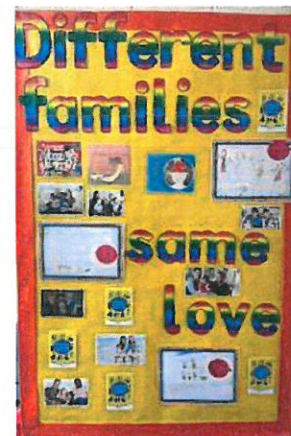
Kimbolton

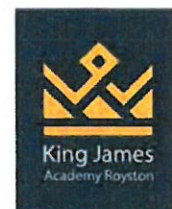

Trips - we are so pleased that we were able to provide trips away from school for the children.

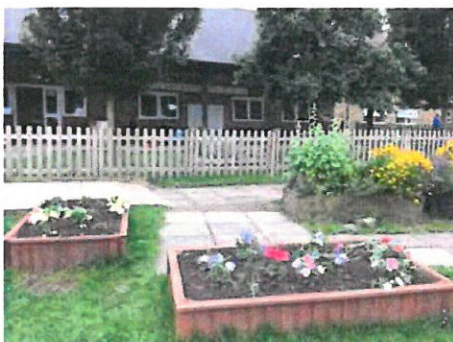

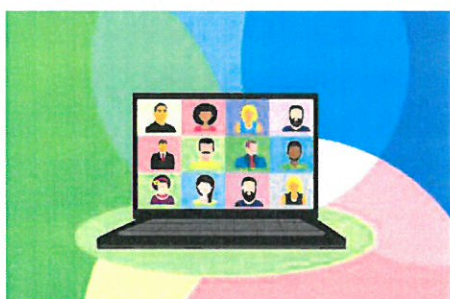




THE DIAMOND TEACHING SCHOOL ALLIANCE

A huge thank you to all the course facilitators, mentors and consultants who have spent time this academic year supporting and training others whilst managing their own teaching and leadership commitments.

We have continued to write and lead remote training sessions for teachers and teaching assistants across the DLPT and local area this term, and in total we have welcomed over 1000 people to our courses throughout the year.



New courses are being designed ready to launch in September and we hope to offer a blended model of training. Online courses have meant less travel time for participants but we all miss being in the same room together. It will be great to share excellent practice and ideas face to face again.

Congratulations to our School Direct trainee teachers, who have all qualified this term, gaining Qualified Teacher Status. They are now preparing for their first teaching jobs.
