

#### **Mock Election at King James**

Election fever has taken hold of King James Academy in Royson as students from all years got to participate in their own version of the general election. Organised by students from year 10, each class within the school represented its own constituency with a seat in the King James Parliament. The election was set to mimic the real thing- with each constituency having an electoral role and students attending a polling station to record their vote. In common with the general election each constituency worked on the 'first past the post' principle.



In preparation for this election students have been learning about the political process in Britain as well as the manifestos and policies of the 5 main political parties. Lisa Plowman, Headteacher, said "This mock election is an excellent addition to our already extensive personal development program. We have a moral obligation to educate young people, and we believe that part of this is to help them navigate the world around them. We are rightfully proud of what we do to support students in developing into well rounded citizens of the future. Our character values, of which respect is a key one, form a golden thread through everything we do as a school, evidenced clearly by the way students have taken the lead with organising the election".

At the end of the day Year 10 hosted their own live election broadcast to announce the results to the school. Deputy Head Prefect Holly Watson said, "it was really interesting to see how our electoral system created such a difference between the votes cast and the MPs elected. It has been a great opportunity to learn about the difference between different political systems."

#### Year 7 to 10 Athletics District Championships



Most of the children enjoyed identifying the aorta, ventricles and atriums, but I think it would be fair to say that some will refrain from pursuing a career as a surgeon!

The topic in Scotland class has been 'World Explorers', which has seen the children travelling to the different continents and looking at transport modes to get there. They have looked at different cuisines, made our own pizzas with the tasting part being their favourite! The children have loved the warmer weather and being outside, enjoying creating their own forms of transport. They have read 'Mr Gumpy's Outing' and designed our own boats using the iPads.



Many of our pupils have had the opportunity to step outside school to participate in exciting trips.

Year 2 were invited to a 'Skills Escalator Day' at, the North Cambridgeshire Training Centre (NCTC) in Chatteris. During the day, they learned about different careers and having a go at different jobs. The day was supported by the Police, the RAF, the NHS, HSBC and Metalcraft. The children explored a wide range of tasks including manoeuvring a digger, virtual welding and making whirlybirds!

Year 3 and Year 4 class visited a local secondary school to take part in a 'Read to Succeed' event whereby the author Ann-Marie Howell read extracts from her books. The children were also given the opportunity to participate in a question-and-answer session.

Year 5 were lucky enough to participate in a Whistle Stop Music tour workshop provided by Historic England. They discussed the history of the Fens, tried some traditional Morrison dance steps and practised their wassailing skills!

Year 6 visited March Fire Station to take part in their Safety Zone Day. The children were faced with several different scenarios involving water and fire safety. One of the scenarios involved the fire crew demonstrating the equipment on their appliance, before allowing the children to have a go! Their smiles say it all!

Alongside trips, a selection of our pupils have participated in a cricket tournament at March Cricket club, with other pupils showing great team spirit in the pool during the DLPT swimming gala. All our pupils have also all taken part in our annual sports afternoon.

Finally, I would like to wish our current Year 6 children well as they move to Secondary School. They have been a fantastic bunch of children that have been a great asset to the school. They are all friendly, kind-hearted and work so well as a team. It was lovely to finish the term with their last Sports Day, a farewell assembly and a trip to Gulliver's World. Good luck Year 6, we will miss you.



## Winhills

Another incredibly busy term here at Winhills. Here are some of our highlights.

In EYFS, children have been looking at 'Jack and the beanstalk' and have completed many activities based on this book – including growing some of their own beanstalks! They have also looked at snails, including designing party shells for their snails. Children have even welcomed five little, hairy new additions to the classroom in the form of hungry caterpillars. They have been watching them grow over several weeks.

In KS1, one class has ventured into space with their learning, based around the book 'The Great Balloon Hullabaloo'. Children designed their own balloons, described them before creating them. Our Year 2 children looked deeper into exploration in space and spent time researching both Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin and how this changed the future of space exploration. They even sampled some space ice cream!





In lower KS2, children have focused their topic learning on Anglo-Saxons – looking at artefacts, people of power and how people have passed on their wisdom to others. In DT, children have designed and created their own sling shot cars. Outdoor learning has continued and children are now responsible for their own flower bed as well as spending more time within the school grounds promoting learning out of the classroom.

In upper KS2, Year 5 children have worked on adventure stories in English – focusing on villains, heroes and settings. Science has focused on forces, spending time on air resistance linked with famous scientists. In topic, work has been completed on The Mayan Civilisation linked with rainforests. Year 6 have spent the start of the term getting as prepared for SATs as possible and added some amazing pieces of writing to their individual writing portfolios. Both year groups have been reintroduced to forest school based learning and all children have thoroughly enjoyed their time outside within the school grounds.



Many school trips have been organised for our children, some local and some further afield! Some children were able to attend our Rotary Club Kids Day Out! at Wicksteed Park – we managed to have fun on some rides, we might need to reconsider riding the log flume first! Being wet didn't affect our Year 4 children who attended their Grafham Water residential – they loved all of the chosen activities and went through quite a lot of clothes due to dirt and dampness! All children from Year 2 to Year 6 have had the opportunity to visit our local library (in St Neots town centre), some have even joined the library service. Nearer the end of term, KS1 children will visit Audley End, Year 5 will spend the day at Legoland (which they helped raise over £300 to cover some of the cost) and Year 6 will have their residential at Hilltop.

Finally, it can't go without any reference that we had an Ofsted inspection at the start of May. We are very proud of remaining a good school and the report has been shared on our website and with parents!



As the 2023-2024 school year comes to a close, we have been very busy here at Wintringham!

The children in Year 4 visited Grafham Water for their first residential trip with us. It was an action packed few days away with water activities including stand up paddle boarding, kayaking and raft building as well as lots of land-based activities including low ropes, Jacob's Ladder, archery and bushcraft. We were very fortunate, and the sun shone for us for most of the trip. In the evening, the children enjoyed sipping hot chocolate and roasting S'mores on the campfire before getting some well-earned rest in the Bell Tents.







Year 1 recently visited Henbrook House for a Teddy Bear's picnic with the residents. They took part in a variety of teddy bear related activities, listened to stories with their own bears and even had a dance and a sing with some of the residents. The children had a great time and said they couldn't wait to return!

The children in Reception had a fantastic trip to Sacrewell Farm. We were incredibly lucky with the weather, which made the day even more enjoyable. The children enjoyed looking at all the different animals including seeing some piglets. The children also explored the Mill and learnt what a mill was used for. To support with this, the children listened to the story 'The Little Red Hen'. The children were very well-behaved and represented Wintringham very well.

Over the past few weeks, the Eco-Committee have been working together with Stonebond Developers to produce a thriving environment for our local wildlife. Initially, the children designed a wildflower planter for our pond area, before these designs were taken by the Stonebond team to purchase the necessary materials. Stonebond constructed the planter and this was followed by the eco-committee planting its first flowers. A huge well done to the eco-committee!
