Funding received: Total £18,000 (£16,000 plus £10 per eligible pupil)

<u>Background:</u> The Government have provided funding of £150 million for Physical Education (PE) and sport to schools. This funding should be used to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sport provision. The funding is for the period 1 September 2019 – 31 August 2020. This funding is ring fenced to be used for sport specific areas to make a sustainable impact in Physical Education and Sport in schools. Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sport provision, including increasing participation in PE and Sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

The revised vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium is:

All pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

OBJECTIVE: To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
- 2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- 3.Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5.Increased participation in competitive sport











Key achievements to date:

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- SSOC
- Gold school games mark achieved 3 years running.
- All staff attended appropriate CPD for PE lead by Hunts SSP. These included Early Years, KS1 Dance, Tag Rugby, Hockey and OAA.
- 66% in Autumn of children took part in extra-curricular activities. *Due to Covid-19 school closure, clubs did not run for the second half of Spring Term or Summer Term.
- All KS2 children participated in DLPT events for Autumn and for part of Spring (Due to Covid 19 school closures, not all of these took place).
- Opportunities for children to attend a variety of competitive events during Autumn term and the start of Spring Term.
- Play leaders have started to create an engaging and exciting atmosphere on the playground.
- Peer mediator training allowed for conflicts on the playground to be resolved by the children.
- Due to Covid-19 school closure, not all CPD sessions were taken from Hunts SSP. This will be continued into the new academic year.

- A real KS1 focus on the fundamentals of movement to embed these skills to allow the children to apply them throughout their school journey.
- MDS training in the Spring Term (or when restrictions allow) to work alongside the Year 6 Play leaders to ensure the longevity of an active playground.
- A change in approach to the timetabling of swimming to ensure a high percentage are able to swim on leaving school.
- Two-year groups to swim this year to ensure catch up for those that missed it.
- To ensure the upskilling of staff in the teaching of PE to allow for the longevity of PE in the school.
- Review the PE curriculum again to see what worked well in Autumn Term from last year.
- To plan in extra DLPT sports events to catch up on missed ones.
- To ensure the school enters competitions to allow for G and T and SEN children to compete against similar abilities to improve their sportsmanship and skills.

Additional swimming did not take place in this academic year due to Covid-19 school closures. This money will be carried forward into next year.
